MARCH HOST PROFILE...

Rob & Renee Johnson, Riverside

ew ponds, as in recently finished or never visited before, are →always a treat for our embers. We get to see someone else's dreams realized and their labors rewarded; we can judge with a critical eye, or just enjoy seeing the myriad variations on the same theme on which we wrote in our day: the creation of an artificially natural environment so our beloved koi can thrive. So we head to **Rob & Renee Johnson's** home in rural Riverside

ven with the best of designs, plans and equipment, construction an present problems...challenges. Renee designed this 20,000gallon pond (total system volume), and with Rob in the construction business, they had all the equipment they might need at hand. For help with the filtration, they turned to Pat's Koi, then started the dig. Although their home sits above most neighbors, they're not the top-of-the-hill: the front yard had a steep slope up to a higher property. Taking advantage of that slope, Renee put the pond in front to make a waterfall easier to build.

hy did no one warn any of us that Riverside is built on clay and granite? The backhoe struck rock on the first attack, so carving out the area for a retaining wall, stair-stepping 32' feet (top to bottom) into six levels for the falls, and excavating a 42' long by 12-22' wide hole to 3½-5' depths took a while, and resulted in a small mountain of DG (decomposed granite). You can walk beside the house along the pond's edge to the filters and a sheltered patio, and there you'll find an lined oval Q-tank teeming with fry from a spawn last July 7; they're still small, most under 3", and many will go to the Auction.

9 VC was used throughout, $2\frac{1}{2}$ " to the pump and 2" beyond. Intake is from the deepest point, at the end nearest the front door and 40' from the 3/4hp pump. From there, water goes to an *AquaUltraViolet* Ultima II 20,000 bio-mechanical filter (rated for up to a 20,000-gallon pond), through parallel UV lights totaling 64 watts, and into a bio-pit to be filtered through gravel, then returns to a pool at the top of the waterfall. The bio-pit, 8' x 5' x 4' deep, is located to the left behind the wall around the equipment. A

blower in the system feeds two airlines under the gravel there; it's also used when cleaning the filter. The filter handles 5500-6000gph

nly 2½ years old, the pond is home to about 40 koi, collected from eBay, our 2015 Auction, and Inland Koi. The water is warming up nicely, especially in our recent heat wave (it's in full sun most of the day), and they have just started feeding again always near the waterfall. They use Hikari wheat germ in the Fall and Spring, but in Summer they feed 4-5 times a day with Hikari's Hi-Growth (43% protein). Rob tests once or twice a week for all water parameters, especially chlorine, nitrates and nitrites; the pH is about 7.3 at present. The pond is also nicely lit by six underwater lamps; an auto-timer and photocells turn them on for 4 hours a day.

y ew, but not without its problems. • Rob was told to put fish into the pond as they began to fill it, so he dumped 75 two to three-inch koi in; within 12 hours they were all dead. • During Winter 2015-16, a parasite killed about 4 fish; Rob had salted the pond for Winter, using six 40# bags to take it to 2.0, but then he couldn't get the salt level low enough to be able to treat come Spring. • The recent torrential rains made them overly aware of the

neighbor's roof; gutterless, eaves extend over the block wall and runoff poured into the Johnsons' yard right behind the waterfall, cutting deeply into and washing away enough of the soil to expose the footings of the wall.

o come with your thinking caps on. I am told that we'll discuss construction challenges and that Rob and Renee would like input from the club on what they should do next to complete the overall landscaping. Do remember your chairs, something for the buffet, and your renewal form for this year. We're going to set up outside the garage so the blinding afternoon sun will be blocked by the house. There should be ample parking in the driveways, although some may need to park on the road. Note the instructions below that this home is on a dirt road that's not well marked nor GPS-friendly. While there, look around for our new members and help them feel welcome and included. 🗷

DRIVING & PARKING INSTRUCTIONS:

Via Frontera is a dirt road, west off of Mockingbird Canyon Rd. 17455 is at the end of it and on the right, with two driveways. Many cars can park in the first driveway; save the second drive for our 'handicapped' only. Please do not block gates or driveways if you have to park on the road.

DO NOT RELY ON YOUR GPS and DO NOT USE WASHINGTON or any streets off it to reach Via Frontera: new home construction has most of the through streets closed and fenced off.

From points south, exit on Cajalco to El Sobrante; stay to the right at 'Y' where it joins Mockingbird Canyon Rd. It is 3 miles

from Cajalco to Via Frontera, then turn left; it is not the most visible of streets [second left after Markham, or next left after Mariposa]. Coming east or west on the 91, exit on Van Buren south. At bottom of the hill, Mockingbird Canyon Rd. (a signal) T's off to the right. It's about 2 miles to Via Frontera, the second right after Rancho Sonado Rd. (note photo of the street sign)




Koi Auction & Used Equipment Sale

■ There is also a Pre-Registration for members who wish to sell fish at the Auction. To control the total number of "lots" or bags offered, we suggest a limit of six (6) bags per member family. Remember that smaller koi can be combined in one bag (max of 5 per bag), while larger fish need to be bagged separately. The club will provide bags (M & L) & rubber bands as needed before the Auction. When checked in, koi will be inspected for body conformation, injuries, and disease, and may be rejected.

Now is a good time to inventory your koi, while they are still a bit lethargic, to decide which you might sell. As the date draws nearer, you may want to put them in quarantine to make it easier to bag them for transport. It will also be easier to guit feeding them for a few days before Auction if they are in isolation.

- Auction is also an opportunity to sell any used equipment you have taking up space in your garage.
- Koi or Equipment may be donated to IKS for sale, or you can take an agreed split on the sale: Koi Sellers agree to a 50/50 split with the club up to \$300; the maximum IKS can take is \$150 per "lot." Equipment Sellers agree to a 75/25 split (seller/club) of selling prices. Sellers' portions are paid by check, mailed to registered address. There will be <u>no</u> private sales in the parking lot.
- Auction meetings will be at Nick's home at 7pm (dessert) on March 15, April 12, and May 24; review at June 28 Board mtg.

utside may be wet, but it doesn't damper our spirits! We even had three guests come out and place membership with us. *Alex Franco* has been nagged by *Tom Wright* and *Joe* and *Peter*, so he came to a meeting close to his home in Tustin. He has four ponds, ranging from 1000 to 7000 gallons, and a wife who doesn't like koi. (Alex, a landscaper, said he noted the *Milfeld* name in our newsletter; *couldn't be*, he thought, for he always specifies only Milfeld azaleas for his jobs. ach meeting includes a pond talk by the owner, so *Joe and Peter* answered questions about the business. Can't believe it's only 2½ years since they moved from Riverside, but here they are! Business keeps improving, but it would be tough at either location. Yes, they still have koi in the swimming pool at the house, but only smaller ones and no "prizes."

lunch again had our cooks going for their crockpots, plus salads, pizza and chicken, and lots of desserts! *Mary Leever* always brings a cake to honor birthdays and anniversaries in the month, but this time special recognition went to *Theo & Jeanne Zoetemelk*, celebrating their 52nd anniversary at the meeting surrounded by good friends and warm wishes. *Debby* managed to get everyone to sign a card for them without them knowing.

ushing on to the business of the day, Rob had *Nick* talk of the coming June 3 Auction (*see pg. 4*). needing nearly 40 people to make it all run smoothly, he passed around a sign-up sheet for volunteers and encouraged members to start looking at what fish they may want to sell, emphasizing that this is our biggest public event and covers expenses for a couple of years.

xploring the *Nutritional Needs of our Koi* was the theme of the presentation by *Eva Gaglione* of *Ultra Balance*, one side of *Star Milling Co.*'s family-owned manufacturer of private label pet foods and other animal feeds in Perris. They make custom formulations in pelleted, extruded and textured forms, with species-specific nutritionists guiding the process. They don't follow the fads in koi feeding, but focus on formula changes according to good science and new research, with the goal of longevity and overall health for the fish. They ship to all states

koi for the last few months, but water temps are warming and the koi will be getting hungry soon. Water warms faster than the fish do and their metabolism and immune systems have been way down; keep an eye on them for disease flare-ups — *Aeremonas* season is coming. Last month's lessons on koi behavior will help you know when things are off. Don't judge by the first warm weekend, but when the water temp levels out above mid-50s, start slowly feeding. We've been giving about a cup of food every other day until last weekend, now twice daily, as our water is at 56°F; some folks start with the same regimen using Cheerios to tempt the koi into eating again.

erating fish wastes which will, in turn, gradually recharge your biological filter. A common practice is to do a 10% water change after a rain (*How many of us did that this season?!*), and Larry noted that the best water

you can get right now is your tap water: the city has to know the exact water quality parameters. A broad spectrum treatment, *ProForm-C* or *MicrobeLift*, is good preventive medicine for the control of a range of diseases including *ich*, *Costia*, *Trichondina*, *Chilodonella*, *Oodinium* and fungal infections. These are a malachite green & formalin formula that





is the safest and least toxic to koi. Dose daily for three days with a partial water change. You <u>don't</u> need to bypass your bio-filters, which allows a more comprehensive treatment of the entire pond system, and they can be used in water temps as low as 50°F, making them great in Spring and Fall. Be forewarned: they will turn your pond bright blue, and they <u>should not</u> be used with salt. A gallon of either will treat a 12,800-gallon system three times (or 38,400 gallons); for Nick, that's his pond and enough left over for the QT system.

There's a "temperature dynamic" regarding the feeding of fish. Fish are cold blooded, meaning they are 'water temperature' if you touch them. They don't generate heat, and their metabolism is directly affected by water temperature. So when they are cold, they have a very slow metabolism. When they are hot, their metabolism is racing. For every ten degrees increase in temperature, the metabolism of a cold-blooded organism doubles.

hree formulas for koi were discussed, *Maintenance*, *Growth*, and a *Premium* formula. The Growth Formula is for the first 2-2½ years, while koi are growing the most. It was emphasized, however, that whether brand name or generic, the food won't matter if the home environment is wrong. Water parameters and space will change fishes' growth patterns; overcrowding hinders their growth, and genetics play a major factor, too.

The key for growth is to treat your koi as the babies they are, feeding small amounts several times a day so they can assimilate, metabolize and utilize the nutrients. Note that growth foods are for use when the water temp is 64°F and above. "Diaper changes" need to be made, too — that's the attention you pay to water quality!

A *Maintenance Formula* is for the over 2½-year-olds for year-round feeding, although it was originally designed for Fall and Winter use. Koi don't need the growth diet after the first couple of years of rapid growth, and its excesses are excreted out as waste anyway, so it's wiser to change their diet.

The formulas include spirulina, shrimp meal and marigold extract; biotics are added for gut health, plus fine minerals; and vucca extract to help reduce ammonia excretions, thereby helping reduce algae growth (not a cure, but a help in minimizing algae issues). A huge 99% of the nutrients are available to the fish's cell growth.

3: How do you feed in a mixed pond, with several large mature koi, if you want to add new younger fish?

A: If not feasible to separate them, use the growth food, even though the big fish will out-compete the smaller. Some people mix sizes and a variety of foods; the big fish will eat it all. Older fish will flush lots of the nutritional value of the excess food they consume, mostly through the gills or as ammonia, not as poop. This will cause problems if you don't watch your water quality, and it can cause fatty livers and fatty hearts. Some push for growth with a modified trout diet, up to 40-50% protein; a proper diet for age will be a maximum of 30%, and the koi so fed will probably outlive the one forced to maximize its growth potential too early.

Q: Can you put some in QT and feed them separately?

A: Absolutely. At this point Carl Leever offered that after a spawn he would use chicken wire to partition off an area in his pond: only small koi could pass through the wire to the area where he used only the small growth food. He would scatter other food over the pond for the larger fish, training them away from the small-food area.

For safe rapid growth, Iva noted that from spawn to 3-3½", koi need a 50% protein diet (12% fat); 3½" to 4-5", they need 45% protein with 12% fat; to 6", a 40/10 formula, then balance out with 37-38% protein.

a: At what size do you move smaller fish to the large pond?

A: At 8-12" they're ready to compete for food. The number of koi in the smaller pond requires more attention to water quality. Breeders move their koi gradually from 500-gallon to 5,000-gallon to 50,000gallon ponds, carefully monitoring fish size and water quality.

Koi Horoscope

Koi Horoscope: Moving on....

This month we'll move to the next year, 2019, Year of Yamabuki Ogon, a parallel to the Year of the Boar.

The Boar is seen as honorable, philanthropic, optimistic, determined, sincere, sociable.

Certainly we know that koi are sociable creatures, always honored, and just watching them a while can turn your own mood optimistic. And they must be determined to persevere, as designed, through the coldest of winters in

harsh conditions we can only imagine, and bounce back hungry again!

Year of the Yamabuki (and other) Ogon

Ogon Koi are the single colored, metallic variety of Koi that is held in the utmost regard by enthusiasts the world over. These mono-toned, yet utterly striking fish belong to the class called "Hikari Muji Mono." Hikari is Japanese for "metallic", Muji means "single colored", and Mono means "ones" (in other words, the "Metallic single colored ones"). While an amateur koi enthusiast may pose the question, "What's so special about a koi that has only one color?", an Ogon really needs to be seen to be completely appreciated.

At the recent San Diego Koi Show, there was an enormous size 7 Hikari Muji that stopped everyone in their tracks as they viewed the tanks. Floating sunshine. Better than pure gold.



The precursor to the Ogon appeared in 1921. This was a Magoi (dark colored wild carp) with a gold-striped back that was bred and cross-bred until the first successful Ogon appeared in 1946. Since then, they have been bred with Gin Rin (sparkly) scaled koi to yield the modern day, truly single-colored metallic-skinned, sparkly-scaled Ogon Koi.

While traditional *Ogon* were once usually only gold, there are now several variations in color.

Gold & Yellow - Early Ogon were gold in color, but had a tendency to become blackish with increased water temperature. This trait was ultimately bred out by successfully cross-breeding with Kigoi or lemon yellow koi.

Platinum - Platinum Ogon are snow white koi, with a body lustre similar to that of the precious metal. In 1963, Platinum Ogon first appeared as a product of cross-breeding *Kigoi* (yellow koi) with *Nezu Ogon*, the silver-grey *Ogon* that we continue to enjoy today. Similarly, there was a successful cross-breeding between the Platinum or Purachina as it was then known, with the Yamabuki Ogon to produce the highly prized but extremely rare Cream Ogon.

Orenji or Orange - Orenji Ogon, or deep metallic orange Ogon, is the result of successful cross-breeding of the Higoi (red koi) with the original yellow metallic koi varieties, and later with Yamabuki.

Matsuba Ogon - While Matsuba, with their characteristic pinecone patterned scalation are normally grouped into the class Kawarimono, their metallic equivalents belong to the class Hikarimono. The most commonly available Matsuba Ogon are Kin Matsuba (metallic gold) and the Gin Matsuba (metallic silver). The dark scale centers should be clearly defined and the scales

themselves should be uniformly distributed over the top of the body and down below the lateral line.

Silver or Grey - Nezu Ogon is often warmly nicknamed Helmet Head due to a characteristic dark area on the center of its head. There are other Ogon varieties, including the Kuro Ogon, a metallic black koi and the Mukashi Ogon, a metallic bronze.

Ogon have a tendency to grow large, are lively and intelligent, and are easily tamed. Being easily visible, even in fairly cloudy ponds, owing to their brilliant metallic luster, Ogon koi are understandably popular with newbie koi lovers. Since Ogon are singlecolored, there is an emphasis on other features to help determine

A quality Ogon must exhibit conformation of body shape, a high quality of metallic sheen, an even coloration and scale alignment, and a clear, broad, lustrous head. It is also essential to have fins of the same color depth with a consistency of color across the fins.

When it comes to buying an Ogon, a beginner needs to be aware, not only of the quality characteristics, but also of the most common faults. *Ogon* can have a tendency to grow fat, dumpy bodies along with fin deformities. Discoloration and bad shaping of the head and fins are other faults to look out for. Pectoral fin deformities can be reasonably common with fins being too small, shabby or totally absent. The characteristic metallic finish must also extend into the fin areas, particularly the pectoral fins.

Missing or damaged scales will also detract from the *Ogon's* quality, as will any scars or tissue damage. Most of these faults are a result of poor breeding or poor environmental conditions. Make certain you know what to look for when buying your koi and don't be persuaded to buy until you are completely satisfied with the quality of your koi.


